

POLINATORS PLAY A KEY ROLL IN YOUR 'HEALTHY SHORELINE'



Healthy shorelines typically have an abundance of plants on the land next to the water creating a buffer between the lawn and the water. This type of shoreline works to filter pollutants from runoff, deter nuisance wildlife, stabilize the shoreline, and slow the effects of wave action. Glacial stones on the shoreline help slow wave energy reducing scouring and the resuspension of nutrients. Natural healthy shorelines can also be incredibly beautiful and easy to maintain without interfering with recreation.

One component of a healthy shoreline is having native flowering plants that attract pollinators to the shoreline. Pollinators can be bees, butterflies, hummingbirds and many other insects and animals. Over 2000 species of birds are involved with pollination.

Unless you look very closely you might not see what these pollinators are doing as they zip and buzz from pedal to pedal. As the pollinator moves along feeding on plants and flowers bits of pollen attach to their bodies and drop as they move. This pollen drops in other plant who are eagerly awaiting the arrival to continue their lifecycle. This pollen is used to produce fruit and seeds.

Using native plants in your healthy shoreline makes this process easier for the pollinators. Native plants have grown naturally in this area for hundreds and





"A lot of people might wonder what pollinators and native plants have to do with water quality in our lakes, rivers and streams" said Lyn Crighton Executive Director of The Watershed Foundation. "It's simple, native plants soak up water, hold it in place and filter pollutants. Pollinators help the native plants thrive." According to Clear Choices, Clean Water (indiana.clearchoicescleanwater.org) approximately 70% of pollution in our waterways comes from stormwater runoff. Native plants slow that runoff due to their deep root system.




A great example of a pollinator working well with a native species is the Purple Coneflower (Echinacea purpurea) and Monarch butterflies. The Purple Coneflower rely on butterflies for pollination and the butterflies really enjoy the

Purple Coneflower's nectar.
Purple Coneflowers are
beautiful, inexpensive, and easily
grown. Homeowners enjoy the
many butterflies that visit all
summer long. This is definitely a
win-win-win!

Finding native species to plant in your healthy shoreline is easy if you know where to look. Good resources include your local Purdue Extension Office, your Soil and Water Conservation District, or visit indiana.clearchoicescleanwater.org where you will find a list of nurseries and garden centers that offer native plant species.
