# PHOSPHORUS: TOO MUCH OF A GOOD THING

Phosphorus is a non-metallic chemical element that is commonly found in nature. It is an important mineral required by most living organisms. Phosphorus can be found in various forms, most commonly phosphate. When measuring the amount of phosphorus in lakes, total phosphorus is measured which consists of both the particulate and dissolved forms.

There are many sources of phosphorus in our lakes. These sources can be natural, such as waterfowl waste, atmospheric deposits, weathering of geologic phosphate material, and plant decomposition. Phosphorous can also be human-induced, such as fertilizer, pet waste, agricultural runoff, and grass clippings.

Generally, phosphorus enters a waterbody through nonpoint source pollution. Rain or snowmelt will pick up pollutants as it flows over the land and eventually discharges into the lake. Stream channel modification, shoreline erosion, and loss of vegetative buffers around water sources exacerbate these

stormwater discharges and increase phosphorus inputs.

Even a small increase in phosphorus concentration can increase levels of algae. Excessive phosphorus concentration, along with an adequate supply of sunlight, can increase the amount of algae decreasing water transparency. As algae cells die, they slowly settle into the deeper, darker waters of the lake bottom and decompose. The process of decomposition depletes oxygen in bottom waters. This promotes conditions that encourage the release of phosphorus from the bottom into the water column. Once this happens, the excess phosphorus creates a cycle by becoming available to fuel future algae blooms.

Legacy phosphorus is phosphorus that's stored in the sediments of lakes and can affect the water quality of the lake for a long time. It can be released into the water through chemical reactions that

occur when oxygen levels are low. Legacy phosphorous is also released when sediment in a lake is stirred up by boat traffic.

Starting in May 2024, the LLPOA is partnering with the Indiana University Indiana Clean Lakes Program. This is a comprehensive, statewide public lake management program within the Indiana Department of Environmental Management's (IDEM) Office of Water Management. We are starting by monitoring the amount of phosphorus and chlorophyll (algae) with water samples taken by the LLPOA in May, June, July, and August. These samples are sent to IU for evaluation. This will provide a baseline that can be used for potential remedial future actions.

The LLPOA will continue to investigate remedial treatments that may be able to be used in the future to deal with legacy phosphorous. These treatments are in the development stage and are extremely expensive. Hopefully this will become more accessible and affordable in the future.

Here are some things we can all do to reduce phosphorous in Loon Lake:

- Plant native shrubs or other vegetation to reduce shoreline erosion (healthy shorelines) and provide a vegetated buffer that helps to absorb nutrients before entering the lake (https://watershedfoundation.org/our-work/ implement/healthy-shorelines/).
- Infiltrate stormwater rather than diverting it. For example, creating a rain garden or building infiltration steps can prevent raw stormwater from entering a lake unfiltered.
- Use phosphate free fertilizers or low phosphate, slow-release nitrogen fertilizer.
   Make sure your lawn service in using phosphate free fertilizers. Reduce the overall amount of fertilizer you use on your lawns.
- Do not rake leaves or grass clippings in the lake or burn brush on the lake or near the shore.
- Do not urinate or defecate in the lake and do not allow pets to do the same.
- · Clean up pet waste in your yard.
- Minimize boat traffic in shallow areas to avoid stirring up the legacy phosphorous that is in the sediment.

We can all do our part to reduce the phosphorous input to our lake!






# **PANCAKE BREAKFAST**

# **HISTORY CORNER**

Loon Lake Life...remembering growing up on Loon Lake.

Bill and Carol Schaefer live on Maple Lane. Bill has a unique history and shared some stories of his early years at Loon.

In 1935 when he was born, his parents had a weekend cottage on Sycamore Drive. When he was two and half weeks old he was taken to the shore and his feet were swished in the lake.

During World War Two his parents sold the cottage on Sycamore and bought a cottage across the bay on Maple Lane. Bill and Carol retired and moved full time into that same cottage today. His Father worked at a photo engraver and took a metal sheet engraved MAPLE LANE, attached to a pole and stuck it in the ground at the corner of Brown and Maple. That was the first signage for Maple Lane!



**Fishing Cabins** 

As a fourteen and fifteen young boy Bill worked for the Loon Lake Resort on the South end of the lake for two years. He was paid two dollars a day. He did anything they asked him to do. Each morning upon arriving at work at around 8 am his duty was to go to the ice house and shave off ice from the block of ice stored in the straw filled ice house. This bucket of ice shavings was then taken up the hill to the Resort Hotel for the ice box. There wasn't electric refrigerators back then!

Another chore was to tar the bottom of the wooden row boats. The boats were rented out to the fishermen that were staying in the Fishing cabins. Bill remembers 8 or 9 cabins back then. The boats were stored in a big barn behind the Resort hotel over the winter. They had to be hauled to the shore for renting.

There was a grocery store and gas station at the bottom of the hill with two Sinclair gas pumps. Along side there was a "primitive" dirt ramp that the old cars were driven up on to do oil changes. The grocery store had an old wooden screen door with a tight spring that would spring the door shut quickly. Bill thinks that is where the old saying "don't let the door hit you in the xxx" comes from!




